WORLD AIDS DAY- December 1, 2010

December 1, 2010 marks the 22th anniversary of World AIDS Day. Since 1988, the face and response to AIDS has greatly changed. While many of these changes are positive, this anniversary offers us an opportunity to highlight how much more still needs to be done. People from around the world will be coming together on World AIDS Day, December 1, to commemorate this year's theme of universal access and human rights.

Estimates from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC 2008) indicate that the HIV epidemic in the United States is—and has been—worse than previously estimated. CDC now estimates that 56,300 new HIV infections occur in the United States each year. This is a 40% increase in the previously estimated annual number of new infections and a sobering reminder that the HIV/AIDS epidemic is far from over in this country. These estimates provide a profile of HIV/AIDS in the United States that is primarily young, male, and African American. The epidemic also disproportionately affects Hispanic and Latinos; particularly Hispanic and Latino men who have sex with men (MSM). Gay and bisexual men of all races and ethnicities are the most affected of any group of Americans. Long Island, (Nassau and Suffolk Counties), still has the highest suburban HIV/AIDS infection in the country and more AIDS cases than 26 states.

In recognition of World AIDS Day 2010, the Long Island Association for AIDS Care, Inc. will be conducting a week-long HIV/AIDS outreach, education and testing initiative. Starting Monday, November 30 through Friday, December 3, our professional staff will bring free and confidential rapid HIV testing and education initiatives to communities all across Long Island.
